Dear Minister

Free School Meal Auto-Enrolment

We are writing to ask that the government acts now to ensure all children who are entitled to Free School Meals (FSMs) are able to receive them. This is sadly not currently the case, and we are deeply concerned that up to 250,000 children living in the most deprived households are missing out on their statutory right to a daily hot nutritious free school meal. Schools too, miss out on FSM proxy funding, such as the Pupil Premium.

According to your own department figures, 11% of pupils entitled to FSMs are not registered to receive them. More recent analysis undertaken by the Child Poverty Action Group in 2021 in the North East of England also found the same rates of under-registration at regional level.

We know from speaking with families that there are several reasons for this under-registration rate, including burdensome and complex administration, uncertainty around the entitlement criteria, language or literacy issues, and a feeling of stigma or embarrassment from families. Schools and councils work hard under the current FSM registration system which is regularly described as cumbersome, and financially and administratively inefficient.

Over the last year, a small number of councils have adopted a new FSM process using an 'opt-out / right to object' model. This involves identifying families through existing datasets and writing to parents to inform them their children will be automatically registered unless they opt-out. Results have been impressive and opt-out rates are extremely low. For example, FixOurFood research has pooled data from 5 local authorities in England who implemented FSM auto-enrolment processes in October 2023. Results suggested that over 2,500 additional children had been registered to receive free school meals, bringing in over £4.5million in additional school funding. Wakefield City Council alone registered an additional 1,183 children through the opt-out model.

We applaud this innovative work at council level, and we hope that your departments will encourage and support councils to adopt this new model in time for the October schools census. However, this process is resource intensive for councils and families still fall through the gaps as access to datasets is patchy.



But most worryingly, the new process has highlighted that existing FSM registration processes jars against the public sector equalities duty. For example, in Lambeth, 89% of newly identified pupils came from lone parent households, 59% came from households with English as an Additional Language, and 79% from Black, Asian and Multi-Ethnic backgrounds (compared to 66% of the school population). This suggests that the existing FSM registration system acts as a barrier to certain minoritised groups accessing their entitlement, deepening inequalities rather than tackling them.

As a matter of urgency, we call on the government to:

- Commit to introducing a revised Free School Meal registration process so that all children entitled are automatically registered
- In the interim, promote and support local authorities to implement the 'opt-out/right to object' FSM model
- Provide datasets to each council to show the current levels of under-registration, by combining relevant DfE and DWP datasets.

It is grossly unfair that up to 250,000 of our country's most vulnerable children are missing out on their statutory right to a free school meal, and we urge you to act.
